Cats communicate with meowing, chirping, hissing, snoring, chatting and growling, but onomatopoeic meowing is the most common. Kittens will meow to their mother, but when they grow up, they usually stop using this voice to communicate with other cats. Often, adult domestic cats that meow do so only in the presence of humans. This is likely an extension of the way kittens use their plaintive brood as a signal. If you have a cat, you probably know that not all meows are the same. You may even be able to determine if your cat is happy, angry, or demanding food or attention just by listening to the meowing type. It is often assumed that cats make these soothing sounds when they are happy, but they snore for many other reasons as well. Snoring can signal that a cat is feeling frightened or threatened and research shows it is also a form of self-healing. This trilling sound is a cross between meowing and snoring, and many cat owners say their cats use it as a form of greeting. This rumbling sound is intended as a warning. They can be a response to humans, animals or other cats, and most cats make noise out of fear, anger or territory. This stuttering sound has been described as a cross between meowing and bleat. It is usually heard when cats see something - often a bird or flying insect - that they cannot reach. It can communicate excitement or frustration. This does not mean that you do not have to pay to use sound effect clips. This means that, at most, you need to pay it once and then you are free to use it without having to pay the creator extra money for any display or copy sold from the final product. You also need to look carefully at the terms of the royalty-free agreement for the clip in question, to ensure that your project type is actually covered! Of course, royalty-free sound effects can also be given away for free, but these two facts are not connected. Most importantly, royalty-free sound effect clips are not necessarily public domain or Creative Commons content! They can carry traditional copyright licenses. Nonetheless, many sites that advertise themselves as royalty-free catalogs also mix in the public domain and clip Creative Commons as well. The bottom line is you should also carefully check the license attached to a particular clip before using it. SoundBible SoundBible is very easy to use. Once you hit the front page of the site, you can immediately start downloading the royalty-free sound effects clips you see. The special license for each clip is clearly marked right next to it and there are thousands of them. If you can't find the sound you want on SoundBible, you can actually request it from the community, which is an amazing feature. The only thing we didn't like about this site was that searching for clips can be a little clunky and the design of the site itself can take a few seconds to understand. In addition, it is an incredible resource and a real credit to the community that supports it. Freesound Freesound differs from SoundBible in one main way - you need an account to download sound clips. In addition, it is quite easy to find the right clips and is generally licensed using the Creative Commons licensing scheme. Although the Freesound library is fairly average in terms of volume, the site itself has some excellent features that should cement its place in your voice library bookmarks list. Forums are filled with useful information and possible answers to most of the questions you want to ask. There is also a very useful sound package, which groups based on theme or purpose. For example, this SFX package has some pretty neat firearm effects. GameSounds As the name suggests, GameSounds hosts royalty-free sound effects intended for use in video game projects. The site is really as simple as possible, with just one page effectively. It reflects the sounds of other sites (such as 99Sounds) as well, with the advantage that game-specific sounds have been collected and curated from the site. Although GameSounds may not have a large collection of clips, all 9,505 tracks are focused on this single goal. So, if you're working on a video game project and don't have much budget, this is an important goal. ZapSplat ZapSplat not only has the best name of any sound effects site on this list, it also has a huge library of 59,000 sound clips. While you can download almost any clip for free, there are some restrictions on users who don't hand over a little money by upgrading their account or donating. If you choose to pay, you can download clips faster and with less to hassle. You also don't need to attribution and have access to higher quality audio clips. Site owners are constantly creating new sounds and so whatever your budget, there's always a reason to come back. although freeSFX has a website that seems to be from the mid-90s, freeSFX is actually organized in such a way that you will find the categories of sound effects you need very quickly. Unfortunately, even if you find the sound you want quickly, you will need to register an account before you can actually download anything. Although all royalty-free sound effects are free to use in your project, you need to redact the site. The collection of 4,500 is relatively small, but there are so many variations that you will surely find more than a few that are perfect for your needs. AudioMicro Here we have a site that hosts over 400,000 professional sound effects clips, many from some pretty well-known media sources. This sounds too good to be true and, to some extent, it is. Although these clips may be royalty-free, you still need to spend a few dollars on AudioMicro. Sometimes the perfect clip just has to be paid for, but at least you know it's a one-off payment and then it's yours to use as you see fit. SoundEffects+ SoundEffects+ only has a strong library of 5,000 small clips, but sometimes quality is much more important than quantity. Every clip on this site has been recorded by audio professionals. Although clips are all free to use in your project, there are some important limitations attached to their license agreement. The usual things about not reselling sound effects themselves apply, but there are also rules like a limit of 100 clips per month, or you'll get an account hold. Apart from these little foibles, you will surely be very happy that SoundEffects+ is part of your audio tools. Gr Site GR site has a very small library of sound effects for just under 2,000 royalty-free sound effects clips, but is curated to be perfect for website projects. So you will find exactly the kind of sound clip that will save your flesh while designing the site and and at the last minute that you don't have the right jingle or little bell to pull it all together. Of course, many of these effects would be perfect for your video project or podcast as well. The site is easy to navigate and you don't need to sign up for an account before downloading the item, so it's definitely worth the bookmark if you're stuck. Partners In Rhyme Partners in Rhyme may have a cheap name and a primary focus on music, but it has a very decent library of professional-grade clips. You have to pay some money for this, but the site claims to have one of the most liberal licenses in the business, with no questions asked after you pay to use the clip for the project. There are some really amazing things here and they have organized it into a logical collection that can also help speed up your production. SoundGator SoundGator is another site that doesn't look like much, but ends up sounding pretty good. After signing up and signing in, you can quickly download what you need and continue your project. User licenses are also quite typical of these sites, where you can use pseudo-like clips, as long as you don't resell the clips themselves. SoundGator made this list simply because of how stripped and simplified it all is. Voting is also feasible in its variations, if not in direct volume. It's possible that one of these clips will end up being the one sound effect you still need to get the job done. Sound good?
